Barriers to Implementation

COMMONLY IDENTIFIED BARRIERS TO BEST PRACTICES AMONG JAILS INCLUDE:

- FUNDS FOR MEDICATIONS (81%)
- CLINICAL STAFFING (80%)
- DIVERSION PREVENTION (76%)
 - WITH PROPER PROTOCOLS, DIVERSION IS PREVENTABLE
- TRANSPORTATION/LOGISTICS (65%)
- COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY (61%)

It's not just jails. These challenges are endemic throughout the system.



Delighted to share this report, "Outcomes of the Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) in Correctional Facilities Pilot Program", which my team helped lead. The bottom line is that this program works, "people treated with MOUD during incarceration were: more likely to receive MOUD in the community after release; 50% less likely to experience death from any cause; less likely to experience an opioid-related overdose; and less likely to be re-incarcerated."







Opioid Environment Policy Scan (OEPS) Data Warehouse

The Opioid Environment Policy Scan (OEPS) is a free, open-source data warehouse centered on the multi-dimensional risk environment impacting opioid use and health outcomes, particularly for justice communities, across the United States.

The OEPS consolidates cleaned and processed data spanning Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) Access, Health, Built Environment, Economic, and other contextual data at the Census tract, zip code, county, and state levels. Its data supports JCOIN research into the communities and conditions impacting and impacted by opioid use and identifying strategies or policies to reduce harm in communities nationwide.

All datasets are available for download as **csv files** or can be **visualized and mapped** for further exploration. Download the entire data repository, or you can filter and download by theme or spatial scale. All datasets are accompanied by documentation detailing their source data, year, and more. Geographic boundary shapefiles are provided for ease of merging datasets (csv files) for exploration, spatial analysis, or visualization.

The **Opioid Environment Toolkit** is a resource accompanying the OEPS that includes tutorials introducing basic spatial analytic functionalities in applied examples, using the R programming language. Researchers and analysts can get visualizations

Spillover Effects

- 15 jurisdictions permanently added or expanded MOUD as part of usual jail services due to JCOIN exposure
 - Ex: Florida jail in WI trial completed OTP certification
- Kentucky justice and treatment partners deepened relationships through JCOIN & developed 1115 waiver application to expand MOUD in KY jails
- Indiana PI served on state task force, using JCOIN data to recommend universal screening for juveniles at arrest (state legislation pending)
- Two hubs changed university HR policies that imposed barriers to hiring people with lived SUD/CJ experience








Purpose

Develops innovative strategies to promote improvements in **HIV prevention and treatment services** for individuals involved in the **criminal legal system with substance use disorder**

CONNECT Structure

- **Regional Research Hubs (R61/R33)**
 - Conduct multisite clinical trials that engage people involved in the criminal justice system to enhance integrated HIV and SUD services.
- **The Using design justice to improve carceral health outcomes (INTERACT) Center**
 - Ensures representation and engagement of individuals with context expertise in the criminal justice system, HIV and substance use in CONNECT research to illuminate key barriers to care and identify human-centered solutions.
- **EngageData Center**
 - Provides administrative support to the network, coordinates dissemination and translation of science, implements rapid research projects, and maintains a data and analytic infrastructure for common data elements.

- **Don't reinvent the wheel** – start with the currently established measures and determine what needs to be adjusted

Core Measures/CDEs – Getting More Granular

For Self-Report, Survey, or Coded Data, Think About Level of Measurement

- Clinical Outcomes
 - Individual Participant
- Organizational Outcomes/Context
 - Staff
 - Leadership
 - Implementation
- Administrative Data
 - Anything that could be coded/abstracted consistently?

RFA Requirements

- Serving as a **member of the JCOIN SC** and participating in required activities
 - Participate in **monthly SC Calls**.
- Participate in **data harmonization and other collaborative efforts** within the network.
- Commit to **provide the MAARC with timely, accurate data uploads**.
- **Participate in dissemination efforts**
- **Engage with the ERRC** to identify potential opportunities for addressing economic research questions. [Optional for R01s]
- **Engage with the CERRC** to ensure that principles of justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion are upheld. [Optional for R01s]
- Host **annual site visits** [Optional for R01s]

Clinical Research Hubs:

You converted my award to a R -- what does that mean?

- All of the RFA Terms and Conditions still broadly apply, including:
 - Required minimum time commitment (2 calendar months)
 - Expectation of collaboration across network
 - Participation in Steering Committee, Workgroups, etc.
- What about my milestones?
 - Milestones are individually negotiated annual markers of acceptable progress – if you fail to meet milestones, award could be restricted, etc.
 - But my award is 9 months, not 12?
 - Don't panic! This is totally normal and we will work with you on implications.

How do these delayed onset projects work?

- **Hold Tight – More Instructions Coming Soon!**
- Clinical Research Hubs (RM1/UM1)
 - Will my budget go up in Year 2?
 - No – the RFA required all applications to set aside \$100k in Direct Costs in Years 2-5 for Collaborative Projects
 - If you did not do this, please discuss rebudgeting strategy with your program officer
- Innovation Hubs (R01)
 - Can I participate in these shared protocols?
 - Yes, but budget needs to be covered either by existing resources OR by Clinical Research hubs?

Data Sharing and Management Plan

- Data Sharing Timeline: Require data to be shared by the time of publication of the main findings, or at the end of the research project, **whichever comes first.**
- **Selected data repositories for JCOIN data**
 - NAHDAP for quantitative data
 - Qualitative Data Repository at Syracuse University
- Re-budget to accommodate costs associated with these repositories
- **ACTION:** Summit updated DSM plans reflecting these changes within the first 6 months of the grant award

Data and Safety Management Plan

- Each hub will be convening their own DSMB (when applicable)
- **ACTION:** Summit updated DSM plans reflecting these changes within the first 6 months of the grant award
 - Frequency of meeting
 - Membership expertise
 - Reporting procedures

What does the Steering Committee do?

- The Steering Committee serves as **the main coordinating and decision-making** body of the network.
- The Steering Committee will **meet monthly** beginning in November
 - **At least one PI from each hub is expected to attend every meeting**
- If there is an issue with broad implications across the network, the **SC will take a vote**
 - E.g., The SC will vote on adoption of key pieces of JCOIN infrastructure, including:
 - **Common Data Elements & Requirements**
 - **Publication Policy**
 - Any Other Broad Policies
 - Workgroups may propose policy or guidance, but adoption requires a SC vote. This ensures every PI is aware of policies or procedures that they will be held accountable for.
 - In subsequent years, milestones will include adherence to policies and procedures adopted by the Steering Committee

The network and network activities **are not a distraction** from your work. It is the work.


Dynamic collaboration is a major JCOIN goal.




