






"Siblings' Experiences"

Episode Overview

In this episode, I explore people's experiences of being the sibling of someone with an SUD/overdose incident. First, I talk about people's experiences navigating their sibling's substance abuse issues and life after their overdose. Then I describe the impact of drug-overdose bereavement on siblings' emotional, physical, and social well-being.



- People learn to navigate their sibling's drug misuse and overdose and have intimate knowledge of the situation.
- Siblings balance their own grieving as well as help their parents navigate grief and loss.

- ✓ Siblings face struggles in navigating life after the overdose of their loved one.
- ✓ People recognize their sibling beyond the label of "addict."
- ✓ Sibling overdose bereavement is tied to increased emotional states (guilt, sadness, uncertainty).
