





Overdose, Harm Reduction, and Sex Workers

Study Background & Context

- Sex workers have a high prevalence of drug use across the world and women sex workers have an especially high prevalence of drug use.
- Not only do women have a higher prevalence of drug use, but with that comes a higher risk of HIV or other STIs and bloodborne infections, poor mental health, and mortality.

Study Focus

Various factors shape health and safety for women who use drugs and their jobs in sex work can impact these factors.

Main Finding

When women sex workers who use drugs experience barriers to harm reduction, they are more likely to have a non-fatal overdose.

Study Recommendations

Sex-worker friendly harm reduction services are needed, and these services must be comprehensive.
